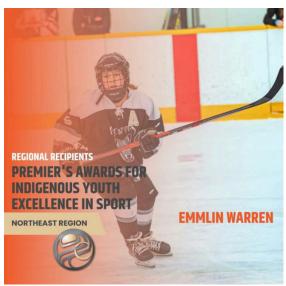

TAKING CARE OF THOSE LIVING WITH **DEMENTIA AND THEIR CARE PARTNERS**

The FNCLS recently hosted a showing of the documentary "Taking Care". The film follows a couple (Seth Rogen and his wife Lauren Miller Rogen) as they face the challenges of Lauren's mother's early-onset Alzheimer's disease. As many will know, this hits very close to home for my family and I. My Mom was diagnosed with Young Onset Alzheimer's' disease in 2021 at the age of 63.

This diagnosis came after a year of noticing symptoms and a barrage of diagnostic tests.

Despite being a health researcher myself and conducting multiple studies on the impacts of a variety of diseases and conditions, having my Mom be diagnosed with a serious and life-limiting illness has often left me feeling frustrated and hopeless. With this column I hope to impart some knowledge, support, and hope to others.

While the terms "Alzheimer's disease" and "dementia" are often used interchangeably, they are not the same thing. Dementia is not a specific disease, rather it is a term for a set of symptoms caused by a disorder affecting the brain. Alzheimer's disease is the most common cause of dementia and accounts for 60-80% of all diagnoses. To put it another way, every case of Alzheimer's disease is an example of dementia, but not every type of dementia is Alzheimer's.

The Alzheimer's Society of Canada reports that as of January 1, 2025 an estimated 771, 939 people in Canada are living with dementia. By 2030 nearly 1 million people in Canada could live with dementia. Every day, more than 414 Canadians develop dementia, this is more than 17 every hour. The statistics are bleak and staggering, but there is hope. Scientists have made great progress in understanding Alzheimer's disease despite not fully understanding what causes the disease. At the present time it is proposed that the cause is a combination of age-related changes in the brain, along with genetic, health, and lifestyle factors. While we can't alter our genes (at least not yet), we can control how much physical activity we get, our diet, smoking, alcohol consumption, sleep, and social engagement.

In addition to the physical and cognitive effects of this disease, the stigma associated with Alzheimer's disease is pervasive and challenging. Just as every case of cancer is unique, so is every case of Alzheimer's disease. Impairments in memory is just one of the many symptoms and in my case the least challenging. It can affect mood, communication, and physical capabilities. In "Taking Care" Lauren states that her Mom "...worked incredibly hard, she was constantly trying to contribute, she wasn't just a passenger". It's vital that we view people living with dementia as whole, contributing members of our communities, not merely passengers along for a ride they don't understand or deserve, a ride you wouldn't wish on anyone.

I'm not an expert and I certainly don't have all the answers, no one does. But I have learned that talking to someone who is on a similar journey can make all the difference. 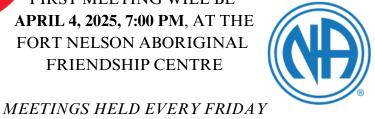
